Honeymooning on Four Wheels in Puerto Vallarta

Nobody believed us when we told them about our mountain biking adventure through the Sierra Madre Mountains on a 95 degree day in sunny Puerto Vallarta, Mexico. We started our morning waiting for the Puerto Vallarta city bus, featuring no air conditioning, no marked bus stops, and a non-existent suspension. The CTA didn't look so bad. When we finally arrived at the Eco Ride "office" (Rogelio's house) we didn't know what to expect. Our guide Rogelio greeted us at the door with Zuca, his dog, following closely behind. In exchange for 1100 pesos (about \$100) we rented two full suspension mountain bikes, two helmets, a few water bottles, and took a private tour through the mountainous jungle of the Sierra Madre.

Imagine the hottest, most humid August day in Chicago and multiply that by 10. Nick looked like he had just climbed out of a sauna after our first uphill climb. Samara was a little less sweaty, but much more tired. How many more kilometers of this? Our uphill portion turned out to be 5K, but felt more like 50!

After building up a sweat and an appetite, we reached our destination, the Jungle Café, situated next to a beautiful and refreshing waterfall. Our lunch consisted of ham and cheese sandwiches, lots of Gatorade and a whole pack of Oreo cookies.



Nick cooled off and relaxed in the fresh waterfalls while Samara took a nap in a hammock.

An hour later, well-fed and recharged, we began our descent back to town. On our way down we encountered a cattle herder and his dog, who were trying to move some cows down the mountain, but the cows had different plans. We watched as the dog futilely jumped and nipped at the leader of the herd and wondered if it would cause a stampede. After about ten minutes of not knowing how to get around this, our tour guide Rogelio decided that we just had to ride through it. Nearing the bottom of the mountain we came to a river. We picked up our bikes, walked across to the other side and finished our ride back to Rogelio's house. Even though it took us half the day to climb to our destination, we were back to the bottom in less than an hour.



As we waited for the bus again, we laughed at our muddy clothes and water-logged sneakers. We never expected that a 10K ride through the jungle would leave us as tired as completing a century, but we enjoyed our adventure and hope to ride it again.
